Kushmanda Devi

(Fourth Day of Navratri)



North Indian Tradition:

In North India, the fourth day of Navratri is dedicated to Goddess Kushmanda. She is believed to have created the universe with her radiant smile. Her name comes from three words: 'Ku' (a little), 'Ushma' (warmth or energy), and 'Anda' (the cosmic egg). It is believed that when everything was originally dark, she smiled and created the universe, filling it with light and life. She resides at the center of the sun, and her energy sustains the universe.

Practices on This Day:

Devotees chant "Om Devi Kushmandayai Namah" and offer red flowers, fruits, and pumpkin, which is believed to be her favorite. They observe a fast and pray for good health and vitality. Meditating on her radiant form is said to increase self-confidence and positivity.

Importance of the fourth day in north



Kushmanda Devi symbolizes creativity, vitality, and positivity. It is believed that worshipping her on this day brings health, energy, and prosperity. She is especially worshipped by those who are experiencing illness, hardship, or a period of darkness in their lives. Culturally, she reminds us that even a small smile or positive thought can create a big change.

Symbols of Kushmanda Devi

She is depicted with eight hands, holding weapons, a rosary, and a pot of ambrosia (Amrit Kalash). Her face shines as radiantly as the sun, and the pot of ambrosia symbolizes health and vitality, while her weapons represent protection from negativity. Her lion mount symbolizes courage. Her smile is the central symbol, showing that light and creation originate from joy and positivity.



Goddess Kushmanda teaches us that we can create light even in the deepest darkness. For children, she inspires the value of positivity, laughter, and creativity. For adults, she reminds us to smile even when facing challenges and that hope and effort can create new beginnings. Her story teaches that small acts of joy and energy can change lives.
